Dear Ms. Dominguez:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Texas Open Records Act, chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 111774.

The Ysleta Independent School District (the "district") received a request for any and all records regarding the construction of the library wing addition of Bel Air High School. You state that some of the information will be furnished to the requestor. However, you claim that the social security numbers, telephone numbers, home addresses, employee numbers and marital status information within certain payroll records is excepted under sections 552.101 and 552.117 of the Government Code. You have submitted a sample of the requested information.¹ We have considered your arguments and reviewed the submitted information.

Section 552.117 of the Government Code excepts from public disclosure information relating to the home address, home telephone number, and social security number of current or former government employees or officials and peace officers, as well as information revealing whether those employees, officials, or officers have family members. This section, by its terms, only applies to current or former government employees, officials, and peace officers. As you admit that these employees of the subcontractor are not employed by the

district or any other governmental body, the district may not withhold the requested information under section 552.117 of the Government Code.

Further, privacy does not protect the home addresses, home telephone numbers, employee numbers and social security numbers from required public disclosure. Section 552.101 excepts "information considered to be confidential by law, either constitutional, statutory, or by judicial decision." For information to be protected from public disclosure under the common-law right of privacy, the information must meet the criteria set out in *Industrial Foundation of the South v. Texas Industrial Accident Board*, 540 S.W.2d 668 (Tex. 1976), *cert. denied*, 430 U.S. 931 (1977). The court stated that

information . . . is excepted from mandatory disclosure under Section 3(a)(1) as information deemed confidential by law if (1) the information contains highly intimate or embarrassing facts the publication of which would be highly objectionable to a reasonable person, and (2) the information is not of legitimate concern to the public.

540 S.W.2d at 685; Open Records Decision No. 142 (1976) at 4 (construing statutory predecessor to Gov't Code § 552.101). This office has previously concluded that home addresses of private citizens are not "intimate" information and, therefore, are not protected. Open Records Decision Nos. 478 (1987), 455 (1987), 254 (1980).


We note that the social security numbers in the payroll records may be confidential under federal law. A social security number is excepted from required public disclosure under section 552.101 of the act in conjunction with the 1990 amendments to the federal Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. § 405(c)(2)(C)(viii)(I), if it was obtained or is maintained by a governmental body pursuant to any provision of law enacted on or after October 1, 1990. *See* Open Records Decision No. 622 (1994). Based on the information you have provided, we are unable to determine whether the social security numbers are confidential under this federal statute. We note, however, that section 552.352 of the Open Records Act imposes criminal penalties for the release of confidential information.

In summary, the district must release the home addresses, home telephone numbers, employee numbers and marital status information contained within these records. If the social security numbers were obtained or maintained in accordance with the federal Social Security Act, the district must withhold the social security numbers from required public disclosure. If the social security numbers were not obtained or maintained in this manner, they must be released to the requestor.

We are resolving this matter with an informal letter ruling rather than with a published open records decision. This ruling is limited to the particular records at issue under the facts presented to us in this request and should not be relied on as a previous

determination regarding any other records. If you have any questions regarding this ruling, please contact our office.
