Dear Ms. Fleming:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 274147.

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice (the "department") received a request for information relating to two incidents involving the requestor and two named offenders. You have submitted information that the department seeks to withhold under section 552.134 of the Government Code. We have considered the exception you claim and have reviewed the submitted information. As the submitted information relates to only one of the incidents described in this request for information, we assume that the department has released any other information that is responsive to this request, to the extent that such information existed when the department received the request. If not, then any such information must be released immediately.¹ See Gov't Code §§ 552.221, .301, .302; Open Records Decision No. 664 (2000).

¹We note that the Act does not require a governmental body to release information that did not exist when it received a request or create responsive information. See *Econ. Opportunities Dev. Corp. v. Bustamante*, 562 S.W.2d 266 (Tex. Civ. App. – San Antonio 1978, writ dismissed); Open Records Decision Nos. 605 at 2 (1992), 555 at 1 (1990), 452 at 3 (1986), 362 at 2 (1983).

Section 552.134 of the Government Code encompasses information that relates to inmates of the department. This exception states that “[e]xcept as provided by Subsection (b) or by Section 552.029, information obtained or maintained by the [department] is excepted from [required public disclosure] if it is information about an inmate who is confined in a facility operated by or under a contract with the department.” Gov’t Code § 552.134(a). Section 552.029 of the Government Code provides that notwithstanding section 552.134, eight specified categories of “information about an inmate who is confined in a facility operated by or under a contract with [the department are] subject to required disclosure[.]” *Id.* § 552.029. These eight categories of information include “basic information regarding the death of an inmate in custody, an incident involving the use of force, or an alleged crime involving the inmate.” *Id.* § 552.029(8). Thus, the legislature explicitly made section 552.134 subject to section 552.029.

Based on your arguments and our review of the submitted information, we find that most of the information at issue falls within the scope of section 552.134. Furthermore, none of that information appears to be subject to disclosure under section 552.029. We therefore conclude that the department must withhold the information that we have marked under section 552.134 of the Government Code. The rest of the submitted information must be released.²

This letter ruling is limited to the particular records at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other records or any other circumstances.

This ruling triggers important deadlines regarding the rights and responsibilities of the governmental body and of the requestor. For example, governmental bodies are prohibited from asking the attorney general to reconsider this ruling. Gov’t Code § 552.301(f). If the governmental body wants to challenge this ruling, the governmental body must appeal by filing suit in Travis County within 30 calendar days. *Id.* § 552.324(b). In order to get the full benefit of such an appeal, the governmental body must file suit within 10 calendar days. *Id.* § 552.353(b)(3), (c). If the governmental body does not appeal this ruling and the governmental body does not comply with it, then both the requestor and the attorney general have the right to file suit against the governmental body to enforce this ruling. *Id.* § 552.321(a).

²We note that the documents to be released contain the requestor’s social security number, which the department would be required to withhold from the public under section 552.117(a)(3) of the Government Code. Section 552.117 protects personal privacy, however, and the requestor has a right of access to her own private information under section 552.023 of the Government Code. *See* Gov’t Code § 552.023(a); Open Records Decision No. 481 at 4 (1987) (privacy theories not implicated when individual requests information concerning herself).


If this ruling requires the governmental body to release all or part of the requested information, the governmental body is responsible for taking the next step. Based on the statute, the attorney general expects that, upon receiving this ruling, the governmental body will either release the public records promptly pursuant to section 552.221(a) of the Government Code or file a lawsuit challenging this ruling pursuant to section 552.324 of the Government Code. If the governmental body fails to do one of these things, then the requestor should report that failure to the attorney general's Open Government Hotline, toll free, at (877) 673-6839. The requestor may also file a complaint with the district or county attorney. *Id.* § 552.3215(e).

If this ruling requires or permits the governmental body to withhold all or some of the requested information, the requestor can appeal that decision by suing the governmental body. *Id.* § 552.321(a); *Texas Dep't of Pub. Safety v. Gilbreath*, 842 S.W.2d 408, 411 (Tex. App.—Austin 1992, no writ).

Please remember that under the Act the release of information triggers certain procedures for costs and charges to the requestor. If records are released in compliance with this ruling, be sure that all charges for the information are at or below the legal amounts. Questions or complaints about over-charging must be directed to Hadassah Schloss at the Office of the Attorney General at (512) 475-2497.

If the governmental body, the requestor, or any other person has questions or comments about this ruling, they may contact our office. Although there is no statutory deadline for contacting us, the attorney general prefers to receive any comments within 10 calendar days of the date of this ruling.
