Dear Mr. Bailey:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 396081.

VIA Metropolitan Transit ("VIA") received a request for all statements, photographs, repair estimates, and completed work orders pertaining to a specified motor vehicle accident. You state VIA will provide completed accident/incident reports to the requestor. You claim the submitted photographs are excepted from disclosure under section 552.103 of the Government Code. We have considered the exception you claim and reviewed the submitted information.

Initially, we note you have submitted only photographs for our review. To the extent information responsive to the remainder of the request existed on the date VIA received this request, we assume you have released it. If you have not released any such information, you must do so at this time. See Gov't Code §§ 552.301(a), .302; see also Open Records Decision No. 664 (2000) (if governmental body concludes that no exceptions apply to requested information, it must release information as soon as possible).

Section 552.103 of the Government Code provides:

- (a) Information is excepted from [required public disclosure] if it is information relating to litigation of a civil or criminal nature to which the state or a political subdivision is or may be a party or to which an officer or employee of the state or a political subdivision, as a consequence of the person's office or employment, is or may be a party.

(c) Information relating to litigation involving a governmental body or an officer or employee of a governmental body is excepted from disclosure under Subsection (a) only if the litigation is pending or reasonably anticipated on the date that the requestor applies to the officer for public information for access to or duplication of the information.

Gov't Code § 552.103(a), (c). A governmental body has the burden of providing relevant facts and documents to show the section 552.103(a) exception is applicable in a particular situation. The test for meeting this burden is a showing that (1) litigation was pending or reasonably anticipated on the date the governmental body received the request for information, and (2) the information at issue is related to that litigation. *Univ. of Tex. Law Sch. v. Tex. Legal Found.*, 958 S.W.2d 479, 481 (Tex. App.—Austin 1997, no pet.); *Heard v. Houston Post Co.*, 684 S.W.2d 210, 212 (Tex. App.—Houston [1st Dist.] 1984, writ ref'd n.r.e.); Open Records Decision No. 551 at 4 (1990). A governmental body must meet both prongs of this test for information to be excepted under section 552.103(a).

The question of whether litigation is reasonably anticipated must be determined on a case-by-case basis. *See* Open Records Decision No. 452 at 4 (1986). To establish litigation is reasonably anticipated, a governmental body must provide this office with “concrete evidence showing the claim that litigation may ensue is more than mere conjecture.” *Id.* Concrete evidence to support a claim litigation is reasonably anticipated may include, for example, a potential opposing party hiring an attorney who makes a demand for disputed payments and threatens to sue if the payments are not made promptly. *See* Open Records Decision No. 346 (1982); *see also* Open Records Decision No. 518 at 5 (1989) (litigation must be “realistically contemplated”).

You assert VIA reasonably anticipates litigation pertaining to the submitted photographs because simultaneously with the submission of the request for information, the requestor submitted a letter seeking payment for medical bills. You state the letter, which you have submitted for our review, is from an attorney representing two people allegedly injured in the motor vehicle accident specified in the request. You explain, and our review shows, the letter alleges VIA is responsible and liable for personal injuries sustained by the requestor's clients as a result of the accident. Furthermore, the attorney's letter indicates his clients will file a lawsuit against VIA if VIA denies the clients' claims for payment of medical bills. Based on your representations and our review, we conclude VIA reasonably anticipated litigation when it received the request for information. You state the photographs relate to the litigation because they pertain to the basis of the anticipated litigation. Accordingly, VIA may withhold the photographs under section 552.103 of the Government Code.


However, once information has been obtained by all parties to the litigation through discovery or otherwise, no section 552.103(a) interest exists with respect to that information. Open Records Decision Nos. 349 (1982), 320 (1982). Thus, information that has either been

obtained from or provided to the opposing party in the anticipated litigation is not excepted from disclosure under section 552.103(a), and must be disclosed. Further, the applicability of section 552.103(a) ends once the litigation has been concluded. Attorney General Opinion MW-575 (1982); Open Records Decision No. 350 (1982).

This letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.

This ruling triggers important deadlines regarding the rights and responsibilities of the governmental body and of the requestor.
