Dear Ms. Clarke:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 427724.

The Lubbock County Medical Examiner's Office (the "medical examiner") received a request for all information pertaining to the autopsy of a named individual. You indicate the medical examiner has released some of the requested information. You claim the submitted information is excepted from disclosure under section 552.101 of the Government Code. We have considered the exception you claim and reviewed the submitted information.

Section 552.101 of the Government Code excepts from disclosure "information considered to be confidential by law, either constitutional, statutory, or by judicial decision." Gov't Code § 552.101. Section 552.101 encompasses section 11 of article 49.25 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, which provides:

The medical examiner shall keep full and complete records properly indexed, giving the name if known of every person whose death is investigated, the place where the body was found, the date, the cause and manner of death, and shall issue a death certificate. . . . The records are subject to required public disclosure in accordance with Chapter 552, Government Code, except that a photograph or x-ray of a body taken during an autopsy is excepted from required public disclosure in accordance with Chapter 552, Government Code, but is subject to disclosure:


- (1) under a subpoena or authority of other law; or
- (2) if the photograph or x-ray is of the body of a person who died while in the custody of law enforcement.

Crim. Proc. Code art. 49.25, § 11. We agree most of the submitted photographs are photographs of a body taken during an autopsy. You state neither of the statutory exceptions to confidentiality is applicable in this instance. Thus, we agree, the medical examiner must withhold the submitted photographs of a body taken during an autopsy under section 552.101 of the Government Code in conjunction with section 11 of article 49.25 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. We note, however, the photographs labeled as 4258, 6183, and 6214 are not photographs of a body. These photographs are not confidential under article 49.25, and the medical examiner may not withhold them under section 552.101 of the Government Code on that basis. As you claim no other exceptions for these photographs, they must be released.

This letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.

This ruling triggers important deadlines regarding the rights and responsibilities of the governmental body and of the requestor.
