Dear Mr. Hudson:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 476898.

The Brewster County Sheriff's Department (the "sheriff's department"), which you represent, received a request for the bail bond books for all felony and misdemeanor bonds from August 1, 2012, to the date of the request. You claim the submitted information is excepted from disclosure under section 552.103 of the Government Code. We have considered the exception you claim and reviewed the submitted information. We have also received and considered comments from an attorney representing the requestor. *See* Gov't Code § 552.304 (interested party may submit comments stating why information should or should not be released).

Initially, we note a portion of the submitted information, which we have marked, is not responsive to the instant request because it does not fall within the period of time specified in the request. This ruling does not address the public availability of the information that is not responsive to the request, and the sheriff's department is not required to release this information in response to this request.

Section 552.103 of the Government Code provides, in part, as follows:

(a) Information is excepted from [required public disclosure] if it is information relating to litigation of a civil or criminal nature to which the state or a political subdivision is or may be a party or to which an officer or employee of the state or a political subdivision, as a consequence of the person's office or employment, is or may be a party.

...

(c) Information relating to litigation involving a governmental body or an officer or employee of a governmental body is excepted from disclosure under Subsection (a) only if the litigation is pending or reasonably anticipated on the date that the requestor applies to the officer for public information for access to or duplication of the information.

*Id.* § 552.103(a), (c). A governmental body that claims an exception to disclosure under section 552.103 has the burden of providing relevant facts and documentation sufficient to establish the applicability of this exception to the information that it seeks to withhold. To meet this burden, the governmental body must demonstrate that (1) litigation was pending or reasonably anticipated on the date of its receipt of the request for information and (2) the information at issue is related to the pending or anticipated litigation. *See Univ. of Tex. Law Sch. v. Tex. Legal Found.*, 958 S.W.2d 479 (Tex. App.—Austin 1997, no pet.); *Heard v. Houston Post Co.*, 684 S.W.2d 210 (Tex. App.—Houston [1st Dist.] 1984, writ ref'd n.r.e.). Both elements of the test must be met in order for information to be excepted from disclosure under section 552.103. *See Open Records Decision No. 551 at 4 (1990).*

You state, and provide documentation confirming, that prior to the date the sheriff's department received the present request for information, a lawsuit styled *Olibas v. Dodson*, Cause No. 4:11-CV-0094-RAJ, was pending in the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, Pecos Division. You state the sheriff's department is a party to the litigation. You also explain Exhibit C relates to this lawsuit. Based on your representations and our review, we find Exhibit C relates to litigation involving the sheriff's department that was pending prior to the date the sheriff's department received the request for information. *See Gov't Code 552.103(c)* (litigation must be pending or reasonably anticipated at time governmental body receives request for information). Thus, the sheriff's department may withhold the responsive information in Exhibit C under section 552.103 of the Government Code.

We note, however, once the information at issue has been obtained by all parties to the pending litigation through discovery or otherwise, no section 552.103(a) interest exists with respect to the information. *See Open Records Decision Nos. 349 (1982), 320 (1982)*. Thus, any information obtained from or provided to all other parties in the pending litigation is not excepted from disclosure under section 552.103(a) and must be disclosed. Further, the

applicability of section 552.103(a) ends once the litigation has concluded. *See* Attorney General Opinion MW-575 (1982); *see also* Open Records Decision No. 350 (1982).

This letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.

This ruling triggers important deadlines regarding the rights and responsibilities of the governmental body and of the requestor.
