Dear Ms. Fourt:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 523351.

The Tarrant County Juvenile Services Department (the "department") received a request for information pertaining to a specified incident involving the requestor's son. You claim the submitted information is excepted from disclosure under section 552.101 of the Government Code. We have considered the exception you claim and reviewed the submitted information.

Section 552.101 of the Government Code excepts from disclosure "information considered to be confidential by law, either constitutional, statutory, or by judicial decision." Gov't Code § 552.101. Section 552.101 encompasses section 261.201 of the Family Code, which states:

(a) Except as provided by Section 261.203, the following information is confidential, is not subject to public release under [the Act] and may be disclosed only for purposes consistent with this code and applicable federal or state law or under rules adopted by an investigating agency:

(1) a report of alleged or suspected abuse or neglect made under this chapter and the identity of the person making the report; and

(2) except as otherwise provided in this section, the files, reports, records, communications, audiotapes, videotapes, and working papers used or developed in an investigation under this chapter or in providing services as a result of an investigation.

...

(k) Notwithstanding Subsection (a), an investigating agency, other than the [Texas Department of Family and Protective Services] or the Texas Youth Commission, on request, shall provide to the parent, managing conservator, or other legal representative of a child who is the subject of reported abuse or neglect, or to the child if the child is at least 18 years of age, information concerning the reported abuse or neglect that would otherwise be confidential under this section. The investigating agency shall withhold information under this subsection if the parent, managing conservator, or other legal representative of the child requesting the information is alleged to have committed the abuse or neglect.

Fam. Code § 261.201(a), (k). You assert the submitted information was used or developed in an investigation of alleged child abuse and is confidential under section 261.201 of the Family Code. *See id.* § 261.001(1) (defining “abuse” for purposes of chapter 261 of the Family Code); *see also id.* § 101.003(a) (defining “child” for purposes of this section as person under 18 years of age who is not and has not been married or who has not had the disabilities of minority removed for general purposes). We note the department is not an agency authorized to conduct an investigation under chapter 261 of the Family Code. *See id.* § 261.103 (listing agencies that may conduct child abuse investigations). However, pursuant to section 261.405(b) of the Family Code, the department is required to report alleged abuse or neglect in a juvenile justice program to the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (the “TJJD”) and a local law enforcement agency for investigation.¹ *See id.* § 261.405(b), (c) (TJJD shall conduct investigation if TJJD receives report of alleged abuse, neglect, or exploitation in any juvenile justice facility). The submitted documents reflect the department reported the alleged abuse to TJJD and provided the submitted information to the TJJD for use in TJJD’s investigation. Upon review, we conclude the submitted information consists of reports, records, or working papers used or developed in an investigation made under chapter 261 of the Family Code. Although the requestor is the parent of the child at issue, section 261.201(k) is not applicable because the department is not the agency that conducted the chapter 261 investigation. Therefore, the submitted information is confidential pursuant to section 261.201 of the Family Code and must be withheld under section 552.101 of the Government Code. *See* Open Records Decision No. 440 at 2 (1986) (construing predecessor statute).

¹Effective December 1, 2011, the Texas Juvenile Probation Commission became known as the Texas Juvenile Justice Department. *See* Hum. Res. Code § 201.001(b).

This letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.
